

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Dear Friends

We are much in prayer at the moment for our church life, for our finances, for moving forward the reordering of St John's building. Here is a wonderful and justly famous verse about prayer from Scripture (God speaking):

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14)

This is often taken to be a promise, or even a formula, for national revival—for example, that if we pray in this way God will bring revival to the UK. But this is to misuse Scripture. There is no nation on earth today that can claim to be 'my people, who are called by my name.' Nor is there a country today that can be called God's land in the way that OT Israel was. This is a specific promise addressed to Solomon and his people dwelling in the Promised Land, to give them hope when times of trouble, famine and exile would come in the future. But this is absolutely not to say that we cannot take wonderful truths from this great promise for ourselves today. Those who are in Christ inherit the promises made to Abraham and Israel, and therefore they are now 'my people called by my name', and so if we read the promises through Christ, then what blessings we may find therein.

We see here that the opening 'if' is followed by four related actions on the part of God's people, and that God responds with 'then' followed by three lovely promises. *If* my people (i) humble themselves, (ii) pray, (iii) seek my face, (iv) turn from their wicked ways, *then* I will (i) hear, (ii) forgive, (iii) heal.

Those four attitudes in prayer are almost one and the same. It is all about humble, repentant seeking of God. These are attitudes that are underlined and endorsed by Jesus and the apostles multiple times. That is God's call to the church, to us: humble, repentant, earnest turning to God and seeking him and his forgiveness and his blessing. Likewise, God's beautiful response is that of a heart that is revealed in multiple ways through the life and teaching of Jesus. The God revealed in and through Jesus is one who longs to hear, who freely forgives, and who loves to bless and restore and renew and revive.

Many of us, I am sure, know all this already. I am not telling you anything new. But perhaps there is still a great challenge for us today. It is contained in that one word 'If'. Read the verse aloud to yourself again, stressing the words, 'If' . . . 'then' . . .

Please, God, make me a person of such prayer. Please, God, make our church a church of such prayer.








True Love, A Tale for St Valentine's Day



ARTHUR BLESSITT

A man who walked across seven continents to share the Good News of Jesus has died at the age of 84.

US evangelist Arthur Blessitt travelled across 324 countries and walked more than 43,000 miles to share his faith, carrying a twelve-foot wooden cross as a way of starting conversations.

A self-penned note posted on his website said he had completed his "last mission on earth and departed to heaven" on 14th January.

Arthur Blessitt found God at the age of seven and became an evangelist when he was 15. After being ordained at the age of 20 he devoted his life to street evangelism. In the course of his 56-year ministry, he walked over 86 million steps with the cross which carried a total weight of over 19 billion pounds. He's listed in the Guinness World Record for the Longest Walk/Pilgrimage.



Blessitt said he was "just a donkey and pilgrim, lifting up the cross and Jesus".

Pre-empting news of his own death he wrote: "What a glorious journey of life with Jesus my Lord and Savior. I've been looking forward to this walk in Glory. These feet that walked so far on roads of dirt and tar will now be walking on the streets of gold. Ready to see Jesus again! I rejoice in Jesus, now, and in the hour of my passing. 'Father, into Your Hands Jesus I commit my spirit'. I am home at last, this was my last trip! I have been an evangelist, soul-winning preacher, pilgrim and cross-carrying witness of Jesus".

He requested no funeral or memorial but asked that we share the good news of Christ across our communities.

Throughout his ministry, Blessitt inspired many, including street evangelist Lyndsay Hamon from Cornwall who gave up his career as a social worker after hearing Blessitt speak at Westminster Central Hall in 1972. He told Premier: "His face was actually shining with the joy of the Lord and he'd just lead a Hell's Angel to the Lord."

He continued: "I remember sitting and thinking, 'whatever that guy's got, I want' and that just grew and grew until I ended up giving up my work as a social worker, and started walking with a cross. But as soon as I started walking, amazing things started happening."

Evangelist Lindsay Hamon has himself now spent much of his life travelling with a twelve-foot cross across Europe and Asia leading people to Christ:

"The cross is an international symbol. And so, wherever you are, whether in Bangladesh or Romania or Bulgaria, they see the symbol. I keep saying, this is a symbol of how much God loves you. So, it just starts the conversation so easily.

"God takes over, and you have the joy of sharing the gospel with people. And sometimes miracles happen and they're ready to accept Jesus. It's the most beautiful moment in the world when they just pray that simple prayer and they feel the presence of God."

Arthur Blessitt said that in his 56 years of travelling, the cross had been turned away from being left overnight at more than half the churches requested, but had never been turned away from spending the night at a bar or nightclub. He said the longest he had walked in one day was 72 miles.

Lindsay Hamon added: "He planted a seed of walking the road that not many other people walk. He planted the seed of great love for the people who wouldn't necessarily be in church. In fact, they definitely wouldn't be in church. So I think all over the world, he brought the message of the cross, the love of Jesus to all people."

The Suffering Church – God's Risk Takers From David Barlow

As we start a New Year in our walk with Jesus we can be encouraged by the faith of people transformed by His Holy Spirit and those whose belief in Jesus places them in constant danger of imprisonment and even death.

Most of us in the United Kingdom don't have to choose between our safety and our faith. Thankfully we don't have to decide whether following Jesus is worth the cost to our family, our jobs or even our lives. But there are large numbers of Christians around the world who have to make this decision daily. The story below is of Ji Ho (name changed for protection) in North Korea. She follows Jesus in a country where any expression of faith could mean a death sentence. Read and be inspired.

We also have the story of Jean Baptiste, a man reformed by his encounter with Jesus and now living a changed life in Rwanda, again read and be encouraged.

Ji Ho vividly remembers the moment she saw her father for the last time, when North Korean Security agents ransacked their house. They found nothing in the house but did discover something when digging in the garden. They found her father's secret book. This book led to her father's imprisonment and eventual death at the hands of the North Korean Government.

Ji Ho didn't know what was in the book, only that her father used to read stories from it about a wise gentle man who taught about love and kindness and Ji Ho couldn't understand why a lesson about kindness could be so dangerous in North Korea. It was only years later that Ji Ho discovered that this book was the Bible.

In some ways Ji Ho was fortunate, when a Bible is found in a North Korean home it could lead to the whole family being punished, imprisoned, banished or killed. But Ji Ho was determined to find out what her father's secret had been and why had it meant so much to him that he was prepared for so severe a cost.

However the agents had not found everything, Ji Ho's father also had a hidden radio which he listened to find out if there was food available or perhaps a way he could escape over the border to China. After her father was taken Ji Ho started listening to the radio, hoping to find a source of food, instead whilst turning the dial she found a new radio station. It was a shock that she heard the presenters talking about the same "wise man" that her father had told her about – the one they called Jesus.

"From that moment on I listened to the radio every chance I got" Ji Ho recalls. "I heard other sayings Man does not live by bread alone and the gift of God in Jesus is eternal life, and that God so loved the world that He gave us His only Son". As she listened she became more convinced that Jesus was the great teacher her father told her about and more that He wanted to be her Lord and Saviour. "And I knew that I wanted to follow Him".

It can be almost impossible for a parent to teach ir children about Jesus in North Korea, children are encouraged by their teachers to look for signs of Christianity and to inform on their own parents! So North Koreans are taught to hate Christianity all their lives, that Christians are enemies and even spies. This makes talking about Jesus immensely dangerous.

This indoctrination has to be unlearnt and Ji Ho soon began to see Jesus speaking to her through the verses she heard on the radio, and remarkably that rather than enemies Christians were commanded by Jesus to love their neighbour. "I'd come home form working in the fields, exhausted and hurting form the loss of my father and I would think about a poem I heard on the radio. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want" and I would see a neighbour who was hungry and hear the words from Jesus "Whatever you did for one of my brothers ands sisters in need you did to me""

Hunger is an ongoing feature of North Korean life for the majority of their people, just surviving is a challenge. Absolute poverty flourishes throughout the country, any food is first given to the armed forces and to the elite, a situation made worse by sanctions on North Korea and the North Korean Government regularly refusing food aid. It is estimated that over 40% of the population is malnourished due to food shortages.

Remembering the words of Psalm 23 and Jesus' words Ji Ho has made extraordinary sacrifices. "As I continued to learn about Jesus I found my life changing. I was still hungry but I started to share my food with my neighbours who didn't have a garden and I hoped I could show something of the love of Jesus to them". Would I be so generous?

Ji Ho shows this love of Jesus on a daily basis but has to keep her faith secret. North Korea remains among the places where Christians face the worst persecution. Despite the terrible cost of following Jesus more and more North Koreans are encountering Jesus and starting to follow Him. Remarkably the church is growing. Agencies like Open Doors are producing radio programmes about Jesus, there are secret networks of believers throughout the country. North Korean believers also want to join in prayer for other persecuted Christians and asked for

programmes about the persecuted church. They know they cannot practically help but they can pray.

But they need help. Through underground networks Open Doors secret workers are currently sustaining over 100,000 secret believers with vital food aid, shelter and discipleship training. "I'll continue to learn more about Jesus and how I can follow Him more closely, and I will continue to be salt for the people around me" says Ji Ho. She ahs so little but is determined to do what she can to show Jesus' love to her neighbours. **Are we, am I?**

There are details below asto how we can help and whilst we are praying about this be inspired by Ji Ho and the many thousands like her, living their lives for Jesus.

Our second story is slightly different but another about a life changed after an encounter with Jesus.

Jean Baptiste was a violent drug dealer and gang leader, feared in his local community in Rwanda, but everything changed after he experienced a whole life transformation when participating in a Tearfund initiative, Church and Community Transformation (CCT) working to release whole communities from poverty. Jean Baptiste's neighbour, **Serapie,** was a trained Tearfund partner CCT facilitator at the local church and asked Jean, whilst he was still dealing in drugs, to "come and see how your life can be changed".

After an attack by a rival gang, Jean Baptiste, after reflecting on his behaviour, joined a CCT group. "I needed to change my life" he says. After joining CCT, attending church and listening to the teaching there and meeting Jesus for himself, Jean Baptiste began to save money, and his relationship at home and in the community started to heal.

Today Jean Baptiste is a warden and security manager at the church, thankful for the discipleship of the CCT community and church and is now an active member of both. Jean Baptiste is a living embodiment of the verse from 2 Corinthians 9:10 "Now he who supplies seed and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and enlarge the harvest of your righteousness".

Please pray for the work of Open Doors and Tearfund in working with the Holy Spirit to change, protect and deepen disciples for Jesus.




The Big Freeze of 1955

More than 70 roads in Britain were blocked by snow, according to the Automobile Association, and hundreds of vehicles were abandoned in snowdrifts. Many parts of the country were cut off from essential supplies, and rail travel was disrupted. Church attendance was also hit, of course. (Nothings changed then)

Temperatures in some places fell below 28F(-3C) - the lowest for 30 years, and February's record UK minimum was set. That year also experienced the last May snowfall of the century, but despite all that, there was plenty of sunshine, and as a total contrast, there was a drought and a heatwave the following summer.

A true story to show how God listens and answers.....



The Christian charity Street Pastors, which ministers to the UK's city nightlife as well as the homeless, is calling for more volunteers in order to keep its Sunderland branch running.

Sunderland Safe Haven usually operates every Saturday night, distributing flip flops, space blankets, and water to clubbers, along with hats, gloves and sleeping bags. But coordinator Julie Judson has told the <u>BBC</u> that the group is down to just six volunteers. A drop-off in volunteer numbers was particularly noticeable after the Covid lockdowns.

"We try not to cancel any shifts but many of us are out every weekend," she

said. On New Year's Eve, the Carlisle Street Pastors carried out their last ever shift after operating for 14 years.

"It's a shame," said coordinator Kathy Howe, "it's very much needed out there - there are vulnerable people out there for all sorts of different reasons."

In 2023, the charity says it helped 120 people. It took 23 to its 'Safe Zone', and five to hospital. The charity describes itself as "Christians rolling up their sleeves and getting involved in practically

The charity describes itself as "Christians rolling up their sleeves and getting involved in practically responding to the problems of crime and safety."

"It's really challenging work but it's fun too because you meet so many lovely people, those out partying, the door staff, the police," Julie Judson said.

"I get more hugs and handshakes working in the night-time economy than anywhere else."
